WILMINGTON VOLUNTEERS DE-CAN AND SORT FOOD FOR GOVERNOR'S WEEKEND OF SERVICE

WILMINGTON, NC – On Saturday, September 11, about 35 volunteers from UNC Wilmington's Sigma Alpha Omega, the Cape Fear Volunteer Center and community participants, deconstructed or de-CANstructed sculptures made entirely out of cans at Independence Mall in Wilmington early Saturday to benefit the Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina at Wilmington as a part of the Governor's Weekend of Service. The cans were transported back to the Wilmington Food Bank's warehouse at 1314 Marstellar Avenue where 25 additional volunteers were waiting to sort and pack the items. The warehouse was also open to receive donations of food and funds.

Governor Bev Perdue announced a partnership with the North Carolina Association of Food Banks and Volunteer North Carolina proclaiming September 10 through 12 as a Weekend of Service throughout the state.

The Governor's Weekend of Service will end on Sunday, September 12. All branches of the Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina (Durham, Greenville, New Bern, Raleigh, Southern Pines, and Wilmington) will be open on Sunday, September 12 from 1pm to 5pm to receive food or monetary donations.
